Trifocals: Snapshots of a Tropical Island was composed in memory of photographer/artist Franklin Gay and is dedicated to his daughter Doreen and wife Janice who are members of my family.

Trifocals was sketched in August 1996 on the island of Curacao and premiered in November 1996 at New York's Weill Recital Hall by members of Musicians' Accord. Dramatically each short movement suggests a fleeting snapshot.... a moment of island life.

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PERFORMANCE NOTES

A number of the movements are constructed as "games" which encourage the players to make rehearsal/performance choices which shape the pieces and lead to greater spontaneity. The order of movements should be determined by the ensemble but all five movements must be performed only once each. The piece should be performed as seamlessly as possible, without pauses between movements.

"OJALÁ" ("if God wills it I hope it will happen") reflects the ever-changing and elusive patterns of events as they unfold before us, and as we unfold them. "OJALÁ" is a game of spontaneous deletion in which players may omit any groups of notes or single notes which lie inside the parentheses.

"BEFORE THE RAIN" is the shortest snapshot and evokes the sound of birds before a storm. There is no game element present.

"SLAVE CASTLES" refers to the dark history of slavery on this island; this "game" is a rhythmic one where unmeasured ad lib blues lines for clarinet are juxtaposed against the fixed lines of the remaining two players. Ornamentation may include glisses, bent pitches and "blue" (flatted) notes.

"INNUENDO" is a game of flirtation. Rhythmically precise but punctuated by pregnant pauses, it should be played expressively to capture the dramatic intent indicated by the title.


"TROIS OISEAUX" ("three birds") was inspired by the amazing bird calls heard throughout the day and evening on Curacao. Of all the movements, it offers the players the greatest freedom. Players may choose:

the order of cells, number of repetitions for each cell, points of entrance for each player within cells, when to play only a fragment of a cell and repeat this fragment, and finally, which player cues the advancing of the group to the next cell and in what manner. Players need not move from cell to cell at the same time or with the same pacing; cells should overlap. The length of this movement should be between $1\frac{1}{2}$ and $2\frac{1}{2}$ minutes.

In some movements high number meters are given (21/8, 17/8, etc.). These are only indications of large phrases; throughout all movements, players should be feeling groups of 2s and 3s.
