Amy D. Rubin 's Mom, Esther bought her a toy piano at Altman's Department Store when Amy was five years old. Amy spent endless hours playing along with the family's favorite LPs, which ranged from the cast album of "My Fair Lady" to the Dennis Brain recording of the four Mozart Horn Concertos. When Esther asked her daughter if she wanted a bigger piano, the answer was "Yes!!!"

Amy started formal piano lessons at the age of seven with Doris Deitch, a young composer/pianist in NYC who was a student of pianist Sophia Rossoff. For six years, Amy and Doris worked about ten hours a week on standard repertoire, improvisation, theory, analysis, and composition, and drank many cups of cocoa with marshmallows together. These years provided the foundation for Amy's desire to build a "Beyond the Boundaries" life in music where lines of delineation blur and imagination has the freedom to prosper.

In 1981 Amy worked as a Master Teacher for the Lincoln Center Institute for the Arts in Education in NYC and its affiliates. There, she met educator and philosopher, Maxine Greene who introduced her to "experiential education" which has guided her throughout her career. Amy and Maxine worked as a team, creating new ways for audiences to get closer to music through participatory workshops focusing on collaborative immersion in the study of elements of art and the creative process.

Decades later, Amy continues her career as an award winning composer, pianist, presenter and educator who creates and performs music for the concert stage, jazz ensemble, film, and television.

She has entertained and enlightened as Humanities WA speaker, and as Enrichment Lecturer on Princess, Regent, Windstar, Viking and Silversea cruises to the Caribbean, South America, Central America, North Africa, Indonesia, Scotland, Scandinavia and Australia . Recently she has given master classes at the Conservatorio De Music in San Juan, Puerto Rico and the School of Music at San Diego State University, California, and has had residencies in Rancho La Puerta, Mexico and Mountambrin, Jamaica.
